



About Sabah

Sabah, also known as the Land Below The Wind, is a state in East Malaysia that is situated in the northern part of Borneo. Its state capital city is Kota Kinabalu, where the seat of the Sabah state government and economic centre is located. The other major towns in Sabah are Sandakan, Tawau, Keningau and many more.



After the Japanese occupation during World War II, the British crown colony status was granted in 1946 until 1963. During that time, it was known as the Crown Colony of North Borneo. Then, Sabah gained self-governance on 31 August 1963 and that was when Sabah federated into Malaysia on the 16th of September 1963.

The state has an equatorial climate with rich tropical rainforests that are abundant with flora and fauna species. Sabah is also home to the tallest mountain in Malaysia and Borneo Island which is Mount Kinabalu with an elevation of 13,435 feet. There are also long mountain ranges on its west side that form parts of the Crocker Range National Park. It is also said that 10 sq. kilometres of Sabah has more flora and fauna than North America and Europe combined.





All year long, Sabah's tropical region experiences sweltering temperatures of an average 30°C. Rainfall is quite common throughout the year as well, but it can be considerably wetter during the North East Monsoon season which usually falls from October to February. However, it is usually hotter and drier between the months of May and September.

Apart from that, Sabah is known as a heterogeneous and culturally diverse state with over 40 different ethnic races and more than 80 local dialects. Although there are many dialects spoken, Bahasa Malaysia is widely spoken across the ethnicities of the state.

Last but not least, as Sabah is a part of Malaysia, they still retain customary practices like proper attire and manners adhered at all times. It is customary to remove shoes when entering a place of worship like mosques or temples or any homes. Due to religious reasons, some may prefer not to have physical contact with others. However, handshakes are generally acceptable as a way of greeting others in a proper gesture.



About Keningau

KENINGAU AT A GLANCE

Keningau, situated in the Interior Division of Sabah, is the fifth largest town in Sabah. In the past, there was a village in Keningau that was overgrown with cinnamon. The community in the area called it kayu kindingau. Then, the British in the area made the Keningau barks as one of their exports. Indirectly, the hinterland had become an important Keningau bark producer during that time. Then, the area was called Keningau and the village has developed into a city today and even became the administrative centre in the interior of Sabah.



It was in 1983, when the British North Borneo Chartered Company established a station and then a District Office as part of its official administration of Keningau. Following the Japanese Occupation from 1942 to 1945 during World War II, local infrastructure and development were put on hold. After the war, the township gradually expanded right after.





Kadazandusun community. They work on the land that was inherited from generation to generation by planting paddy and vegetables to be sold at markets. Keningau is expected to be one of the largest rice producer districts in Sabah.





With some help from the government to cultivate the land, many locals have helped in working on the cultivation of commodities such as palm oil and rubber. Farming is actively carried out with goats, cows, chickens and ducks in Keningau.

Keningau is one of the KDM cultural centres because 90% of the people in Keningau are Kadazan-Dusun and Murut. Keningau is rich in heritage and culture and it can be seen through their arts, cultural activities as well as their lifestyle.

Keningau has experienced tremendous growth and expansion while also preserving its identity and history throughout the years.







From Kota Kinabalu

The distance between Kota Kinabalu to Keningau is approximately 110 kilometres by road. Visitors from outside of Sabah may fly to Kota Kinabalu first in order to come to Keningau. This is because Keningau has no airports. There are multiple ways to get to Keningau from Kota Kinabalu. Therefore, here are some of the possible ways to get to Keningau from Kota Kinabalu.

Bus

One of the affordable ways to get to Keningau is by bus. There are multiple trips that travel to and fro KK to Keningau; there are also several locations in and around KK that leaves to Keningau. Most buses that depart to Keningau from KK are available from Kota Kinabalu Bas Bandaran and will arrive at Tung Ma Station Keningau. The journey to Keningau from KK by bus takes approximately three hours to get there. There are options for buses as you can choose either a mini bus or a bus express for your journey.

Car

Another way to get to Keningau from Kota Kinabalu is by car where you could use the Jalan Keningau Kimanis way. The journey by car takes about two hours. As you travel by car, you get to witness the pretty scenic view during the whole road trip. You can rent a car from KK for you to travel easily.





Train

Sabah State Railway is the only railway transport system that is operating in North Borneo. The train is not a common way of transportation in Sabah. However, if you would like to experience a ride along the jungle railway, this is the perfect journey. You would have to take the train from the Sembulan Station in KK and then ride to Kimanis Station. From Kimanis, you can take a taxi to Keningau.

Taxi

Travelling to Keningau from Kota Kinabalu by taxi is one of the best ways to travel because it is the fastest way to reach your destination. However, it can be quite expensive for a trip as you get to travel in relative comfort. You can also ask the taxi driver any questions related to Sabah as they are more familiar to the area.





From Tawau

The distance between Tawau to Keningau is approximately 340 kilometres by road. Visitors from outside of Sabah may fly to Tawau first before you can come to Keningau as there are no airports in Keningau. There are multiple ways to get to Keningau from Tawau. Therefore, here are some of the possible ways to get to Keningau from Tawau.



Bus

Taking the bus to Keningau is one of the affordable ways. There are multiple trips that travel to and fro Tawau to Keningau. The direct bus from Tawau to Keningau departs from Tawau Terminal Bus Sri Indah and the bus departs twice daily, and operates each day. There are options for buses as you can choose either a mini bus or a bus express for your journey as well. The journey to Keningau from Tawau by bus takes approximately eight hours because they will stop at certain locations to pick up customers on their way.

Car

You can also drive to Keningau from Tawau by using the Jalan Tawau - Keningau road. The journey by car takes about five hours. You can rent a car from Tawau as well. As you travel by car, you get to enjoy the pretty scenic view during the whole trip as the road winds through forests and mountains. On your way, you might get the chance to look at elephants and other animals as well.

Taxi

If you prefer to travel in relative comfort, travelling to Keningau from Tawau by taxi is one of the best ways because it is the fastest way to reach your destination. However, the fare for each trip can be quite expensive.





You are able to commute from one place to another by using any of these transportation options. It is easy to get around Keningau, especially in downtown Keningau since it is not that big. Some hotels and accommodations are able to arrange transport for their guests either at a fee or as part of their hotel rate. Here are some of the transportation options for you to get around Keningau.

Walk



The best way to explore Keningau Downtown is definitely by foot. Visit the Keningau Oath Stone and Muzium Warisan Keningau as it is near to each other. You also get to walk around Keningau downtown while experiencing the lifestyle there as well as meeting the people there. Besides, live a healthy lifestyle and burn some calories while you are travelling!

Cycle



If you want to get from one destination to another quickly and easily, cycling is the best way to do it. Cycle your way throughout these tourist hotspots like the Guang Ji Temple and Keningau Oath Stone. As you cycle, you are able to enjoy the cool breeze blowing gently at your face while you discover unique finds from small back lanes. You will stumble upon handcraft stores, sundry shops, thrift stores and so on while you are cycling. You are able to rent your bicycle at Fun & Adventure Tour Bike Hire Keningau Sabah.

Bus



Travellers can commute from one place to another by using buses or minibuses. There are quite a number of bus stops that can be found along the road; ticket prices may differ according to the distance. At times the buses will not leave until it is full, hence be prepared to wait and share your ride with other people.

Car



It is advisable to use a car if you plan to explore outside of the prime area of Keningau because your desired destinations might be far from each other. There are multiple places where you can rent a car in Keningau.

E-Hailing/Taxi



You can also opt for Taxis and E-hailings like Grab for a fastest way to explore Keningau. By using this option, you get to ask your driver some questions about Sabah as they are locals and are the most familiar with the area.

Heritage & Culture

Introduction to Heritage and Culture in Keningau

As we all know, Malaysia is a culturally diverse country. The number of ethnic groups in Sabah are 42 ethnic groups estimated, with over 200 sub-ethnic groups. Each of these ethnic groups and sub-ethnic groups have their own language, culture and beliefs. There are actually over 80 local dialects spoken in the state of Sabah. The intriguing mix of cultures from the migration communities who settled and intermarried locally has formed the culturally diverse country today, particularly the state of Sabah.

Although there are many ethnic groups and communities in Sabah with different religions and local dialects, the people of Sabah uphold the spirit of unity and harmony. However, traditions and customs have long been part of Sabahans' daily lives.



Each of the communities in Sabah preserves their own culture, traditions, festivals and customs despite their differences. This is done in order to make the state of Sabah a diverse and exotic experience unlike any other place you may have visited.

A trip to Keningau will not be complete without learning and understanding their rich heritage. Keningau's history, traditions and artwork is portrayed in their art and cultural activities. Some of the primary ethnic groups that can be found in Keningau are Kadazan Dusun, Murut and Chinese. However, there are other ethnic groups that can be found in Keningau such as Bajau, Lundayeh, Melayu Brunei and other indigenous people.

Ethnic Group

Kadazan Dusun

The KadazanDusun ethnic is formed by the two main races in Sabah which are Kadazan and Dusun. However, they both share the same language and culture, so a new term is formed to unite both of these races which is then known as 'Kadazan-Dusun'. The KadazanDusun ethnic is the largest indigenous ethnic group in Sabah, with a population of approximately 514,400 in 2004, which makes up 25% of Sabah's population.

The term 'Kadazan' is well known among the Tangara or Tangaa' tribe on Sabah's west coast to refer to all the native Sabahan tribes, whereas the non-Tangara tribes in the interior and eastern part of Sabah prefer the term 'Dusun'. Therefore, KadazanDusun in Keningau is known as Dusun-Keningau.

Most of the Dusun-Keningau are Christians but there is also a significant number of Muslims as well. Initially, they were traditionally animists and now there are still a number of them that still practised animism. Those who are still holding to traditional religion today believe in a spirit world that is especially important in the rice cultivation cycle as well as major events in the cycle of life.

The majority of them are involved in agricultural activities and engaged in planting paddy, vegetables, fruits, poultry and pigs. Some of them even conduct slash-and-burn agriculture.

Murut

Murut is an indigenous group with a population of 50,000 people in Sabah, which is 2.9% of the population. The second largest ethnic group in Keningau is the Murut community.

The Murut ethnic group is known to be experts in hunting and farming, and they were once popular headhunters. This is because traditionally, they often stay in longhouses in the forest that are near to rivers. Some of them are good at making boats and their expertise is passed down to the new generation even though it is no longer practised by the youngsters of this ethnic group these days. Most of the Murut community are involved in the cultivation of rice, tapioca, fishing and blowpipe hunting for a living.

It was also said that the Murut people have extensive knowledge in botanical healing methods and each community has their own healers that can cure illness. This is because some of them still practise paganism as well as animism.

In the past, they used to believe in the practice of *angkapio* which is something that they practise in a community. Besides, they also believe in the concept of *amamahun* which means that there are other creatures that live in other lives such as in the area, tree or in other animals. However, most of them have converted to Christianity, with a number of them being Muslims. However, they are still trying to maintain their culture.

Chinese

The largest non-indigenous group that can be found in Keningau is the Chinese. The Chinese make up about 20% of the population in Sabah. The Chinese community in Keningau had been in the area ever since before the arrival of the British, which was before the second World War.

Up to this day, the Chinese play a significant role in the state economy because of their expertise in engaging with business related activities. Besides that, the Chinese can be divided into three main groups of Hakka, Cantonese and Hokkien people. The Chinese Sabahans are mostly of the Hakka subgroup, hence the Hakka dialect is the most commonly spoken Chinese dialect in the state apart from Mandarin.

Rungus

The Rungus ethnic group is a sub-group of the KadazanDusun, with their own language, a few dialects, architecture, customs and clothing. There are only a few groups of the Rungus community in Keningau. Besides that, they are famous for their beadwork and their traditional clothing shows some of their finest works. The beadwork and designs are easily distinguished from the other ethnic groups of Sabah. Similar to most indigenous groups in Sabah, the Rungus community culture also revolves around rice and other agricultural activities.

Lundayeh

The Lundayeh ethnic group can be found in many districts in Sabah and one of them is Keningau. However, there is only a small community of the Lundayeh ethnic group in Keningau. This ethnic group is not only found in Sabah, but also found in three regions namely in the state of Sarawak, the country Brunei and also Kalimantan of Indonesia. Apart from that, they have a population of 9,250 people that are categorised as Bumiputera in Sabah.



Religion

Christianity

Christianity was first introduced to Malaysia by the Arab, Persian and Turkish Christian traders during the 7th century, whereas various denominations like Catholicism and Protestantism were introduced by the colonizers from the 16th to 20th century. Christianity in Malaysia is the third most practiced religion with 9.1% of the population.

Two-thirds of the Christians live in East Malaysia as there are many who practice Christianity in Sabah and Sarawak when compared to Peninsular Malaysia.

Sabah is indeed an indigenous Christian majority state. Christianity arrived in Sabah in the 1880s. There is a legendary figure called Maharani Dintas, who opened the door to Christianity among the Dusun people in Sabah around the 1800s. The beginning of the Christian Church in Sabah started from a simple chapel made of reeds.

The majority of the people in Keningau are Christians, mainly Roman Catholics and some are Protestants. As you explore Keningau, you will notice that there are many church sign boards and Christian churches along the way.

Islam

As of 2020, Islam is the largest religion in Sabah with 69.9% of the population. Islam arrived Sabah during the 10th Century on the west coast of Borneo following the conversion of the first ruler of Brunei into Islam. Since the amendments of 1973 Sabah Constitution by the latter Chief Minister of Mustapha Harun, Islam is declared as the state religion. In Keningau, you can find various mosques along your way when you are exploring the town.

Buddhism

Buddhism is mainly practised by the local Chinese. As a result of the migration of the Chinese into North Borneo, Buddhism, Taoism and other Chinese folk religions have arrived in Sabah. Buddhism is the second largest religion in Malaysia, however it is the third largest in the state of Sabah, followed by Islam and Christianity. The Buddhists make up 5.1% of the population in Sabah as of 2020. They primarily belong to the ethnic group of Chinese and practise the Mahayana tradition. The traditional 'Chinese temple' architectural style is used by the majority of Mahayana Buddhist temples in Keningau. The majority of the Chinese people who identify themselves as Buddhists really combine Buddhist practices with those of the Chinese culture.

Animism

Prior to the arrival of Christianity, Islam and Buddhism, the indigenous people of Keningau mainly practiced Animism and Paganism. They believed in spirits and invisible beings including both good and evil spirits, especially in the cycle of rice cultivation and major events in the cycle of life.

Some of the Dusun-Keningau people still practise this belief and they are known for their use of *bobohizan* where they control spirits.

In line with this, they celebrate Pesta Kaamatan every May to honour the rice spirit and express gratitude for the bounties of the year. This is a celebration where we get to see rituals and customs that are conducted by *bobohizan*, who are considered to be high priests or priestesses of the community.



Kaamatan Festival

Kaamatan is a harvest festival celebrated by the KadazanDusun ethnic group as well as other related ethnic groups in Sabah. It is celebrated in the whole month of May every year. It is one of the grandest festivals celebrated in the state for the whole month of May. The actual day of the festival is on the 30th and 31st of May.

The Harvest Festival, also known as Tadau Kaamatan, is a significant festival to honour the rice spirit called Bambaazon and give thanks to the Kinoingan (God) for the bountiful rice harvest that ensures the survival of the KadazanDusun. It is an annual event to celebrate the relationship between the Creator and the Creation.

Apart from that, the *bobohizan* (the Kadazan priestess) plays a significant role in the festival because they are the one that determined the official harvest festival date and also officiated the Tadau Kaamatan. However, there are many other events that are held in conjunction with the Kaamatan Festival. Some of the events held annually during the Kaamatan Festival are Unduk Ngadau, Mr. Kaamatan and Sugandoi.

> Unduk Ngadau Kaamatan is a beauty pageant that is held annually during the Kaamatan cultural event in Sabah. It is held to commemorate the spirit of Huminodun, a mythical young woman who embodied complete heart, mind, and soul beauty. This event is one of the most recognizable cultural events in Sabah and a representative from Keningau is chosen to represent the district at the state-level Unduk Ngadau in the KadazanDusun Cultural Association (KDCA) centre.

Besides that, Sugandoi is a traditional song of the KadazanDusun community which was used in the past by the *bobolians* to chant the mantra of gratitude for the spirit of the rice. Now, Sugandoi has become a Kadazan Dusun Song Singing Competition. Each contestant is required to wear their respective district's traditional clothing as they perform.

Apart from that, Mr. Kaamatan is a culturally based male pageant in Sabah and it is the biggest male cultural pageant competition in Malaysia. Mr. Kaamatan is also known as Buvazoi Tavantang, which means 'dashing young men'.

Therefore, Kaamatan Festival is one of the very lively and notable festivals in Sabah. Everyone in Sabah will look forward to the month of May to celebrate this festival regardless of their ethnic and religion as it is always celebrated with great enthusiasm.

Sompoton

Sompoton is a mouth organ musical instrument in the form of an aerophone which is played among the KadazanDusun and Murut communities in Sabah. The sompoton is made up of basic ingredients which are dried water gourds called korobu. The gourd is pierced with a hole containing as many as eight small bamboo pipes of various lengths called *sumbiling* arranged and tied in two layers using rattan. Then, one of these pipes acts as a clamp that gives balance to the entire construction of the sentence without having to make a sound.

The bamboo pipes are then tightly attached to the base of the instrument using beeswax to prevent the wind from escaping through the bamboo pipes when it is blown. The vibration of the reed produces a wind sound made from the trunk of the polod tree.

To activate the *sodi*, it is required to blow and suck the gourd's mouth in order to produce a soft-sweet harmonious and continuous sound, unlike the bagpipe. The players of the sompoton should blow air through the mouthpiece while both hands cover the holes of the end of the bamboo pipes. Therefore, the sompoton can be played as a solo musical instrument for personal entertainment or in groups to accompany dancing.

Gong

The Gong is a significant and well-known traditional musical instrument among the community in Sabah. The gong is made of galvanised iron and then it is joined in the gong frame. It is then tapped in the middle of the gong, while the surrounding parts are tapped with a hammer to flatten it. The gong is usually played during festivals and social events such as wedding receptions, Kaamatan festival and other celebrations. The gong comes in many different sizes and is usually beaten by a group of players, in different rhythms to produce a harmonious orchestra. In some communities in Sabah, gongs are used as a gift in a wedding as well.

Togunggak

A Togunggak is an idiophone type of musical instrument which is made up of six to thirty pieces of bamboo idiophones depending on which ethnic group. Tagunggak is known among the Murut, whereas Togunggu is known among the KadazanDusun in Penampang. These struck bamboo idiophones are played in groups to accompany dancing or processions during occasions. Each togunggak is adjusted to play the matching gong component. giving the music a similar sound to the group's set of gongs.







Musical Instruments

Bungkau

The Bungkau is a jaw harp that is made up of *polod* wood palm stem, which is carved to obtain a two toned design; it is either shaved or peeled. The length of the bungkau is approximately six to eight inches as it is easy to carry. The lamella in the centre vibrates by striking the end of the bungkau by using the thumb. However, it produces a little sound by itself, hence it is required to hold the bungkau near the mouth to magnify the sound by resonance. There are various ranges of frequencies produced by varying the shape of the mouth and the position of the tongue while breathing.

Tongkungon

Tongkungon, a chordophone type of musical instrument, is a traditional stringed musical instrument with a length of approximately 70 cm. The tongkungon is made up of part of a bamboo that is left with holes or splits to allow the echo of the sound produced to be large and the pitch to be higher. The tongkungan strings are usually taken from the bamboo skin which is pinched out to produce seven strings where the tone is adjusted using small pieces of bamboo called pomodu or ponodul and inserted under the strings. The smaller and thinner the strings, the higher the pitch that is produced.

Kulintangan

The Kulintangan is an idiophone musical instrument that consists of a set of about eight to nine small kettle gongs. The kulintangan is made up of copper metal and it is the most important traditional musical instrument that is commonly used by the Dusun-Keningau community. Each of them produces a different pitch when struck. They are arranged horizontally in a row on a low wooden bed-like frame, which enables the player to easily sit in front of the gong and beat them by using two small wooden mallets. The kulintangan is normally used to be played during festive occasions, where it is often accompanied by other traditional gongs and drums.

Gendang

Gendang is also one of the traditional music instruments in Sabah that is usually played during occasions. It is a type of drum that is mostly used as an accompaniment to other traditional musical instruments such as kulintangan, gong and others. Apart from that, there are also some communities that still use these drums during ceremonies for treating the sick. The gendang is made up of materials such as cowhide or buffalo hide, jackfruit or merbau tree trunks are used to make the body part, rattan and support wood. Since the upper part is made from animal skin, the bat must be carefully produced so that the skin is not easily torn when hitting the drum.













Musical Instruments

Sundatang

The Sundatang is a chordophone type of traditional music instrument in Sabah. It is popular among the indigenous people, especially the Rungus ethnic group. It is made up of wood called *tembailing* or jackfruit wood that is stringed and usually only two strings are used to make sundatang musical instruments. The wood that is used to make the sundatang must be hard wood so that the sundatang produced will be more durable. The sundatang is played by plucking the brass strings and the harsh tones of the string is adjusted by turning the ear wood screw on the instrument. It is often used to be played in cultural performances.

Suling

Suling, also known as Seruling, is one of the most well-known musical instruments among the community in Sabah, especially the KadazanDusun ethnic group that is residing in Ranau and Kundasang district. The suling is normally 50 cm in length. It is played a lot during social events and formal occasions and some people also play it to calm the mind, because the music produced by this musical instrument is very melodious. The suling is usually made of small-sized bamboo but some also use pipes to make the suling. However, the rhythm and the sound produced are more or less the same. Normally, the suling that is made has eight holes in total, seven of which are to produce a musical code or beat while the other one hole will always be closed so that the sound produced is pleasant or melodious to listen to.

Turali

The Turali is an aerophone type of traditional musical instrument in Sabah and it is categorised under flutes. This instrument is mainly used by the KadazanDusun ethnic group. Although this musical instrument has a shape that looks like a flute, it has its own uniqueness as it is not blown using the mouth like a flute, instead it will be blown using a blow from the nose to produce the sound. Like the other traditional musical instruments, this is also made up of bamboo, which has a hole at one of the ends of the bamboo. Then, the middle of the bamboo will have four holes, with three holes at the top and one at the bottom.







Dance

Sumazau

The Sumazau is a traditional folk dance that originated from the KadazanDusun people. The dance differs based on each of their tribes. The dance is often performed during the harvest festival and other celebrations and is considered as a sacred dance that links to rituals and religious occasions. Some of the ceremonial functions of the sumazau dance is to restore the plentiful crop and to restore the health of the rice spirit, to guarantee a plentiful harvest, to treat illness by calling upon the spirits of the afterlife, celebrate a fortunate escape from head-hunting, and to satisfy the home's spirit guardian in order to restore order.

The dancers imitates the eagle in flight by stretching the arms on both sides and swinging them up and down that is similar to bird wings. They move their legs in small steps, heels up and down to the beat of the music. The sumazau is usually danced in groups of male and female pairs as they move with rhythm of beating of the gong and drums, with their traditional dress to showcase their identity.

Magunatip

The Magunatip, known as the 'Bamboo Dance', is one of the most popular traditional dances in Sabah. The Magunatip is performed by the Murut ethnic group. In the past, the dance was a type of warrior dance to welcome the return of the Murut headhunters. However, today the dance is usually performed during cultural celebrations and occasions for entertainment.

Three pairs of long bamboo poles are placed horizontally on the ground, and two bamboo mallets are supported at each end of each pair to form three rows of clap bamboo sticks. Then, the bamboo poles are lifted slightly apart, and slam downward to the base with thumps, then tap against each other to fill the gaps. During the dance, dancers would put their feet in and out between the clapping bamboo and avoid being trapped; by that they need to follow the beat of the music and need good timing as they perform.

Mansayau

Mansayau is a traditional dance of the Murut Nabai ethnic group which was a legacy passed down from the ancestors of the Murut community. The dance is traditionally part of a ritual, but today it is often performed during important social gatherings like the Harvest festival, conferences, weddings, carnivals, and so on. The dance is accompanied by traditional music which are nine gongs, a drum and a set of kulintangan. The instruments used in this dance will be hammered according to certain rhythms and one of their common beats is called magadang. Through this dance, the dance is not limited to one form only and can be danced by a pair of dancers which are men and women. As for their clothing, the male and female dancers would wear their traditional clothes.











Traditional Arts & Crafts

Sirung

Sirung is a type of conical hat made from rattan. Like any other tool or craft, the making of the sirung requires a high degree of expertise to make. The sirung is a hat used to protect the head from the scorching sun when working or cultivating in the field or garden. However, the sirung can also be used as serving lids. Now the sirung is rarely used to go to the farm as now it is usually used as a decoration on the wall of the house.



Barait

The Barait is a traditional bag for the KadazanDusun and Murut ethnic group. The barait is known for various uses especially for carrying things such as their crops and animals from their hunt. It is said to be a multi-purpose bag for the KadazanDusun and Murut ethnic group during the past. The barait is made up of special cane bark and is sliced into the desired length before weaving. The size is determined according to the length of the cane that is sliced, and the amount of the cane that is sliced.



Wakid/Viung

Wakid is a traditional carrying tool for the KadazanDusun and Murut ethnic group, quite similar to the Barait. The wakid handicraft was produced by the KadazanDusun and Murut community to be used as a place to put in harvested rice and as a tool to lift them as well. Today, the wakid is suitable for decoration at home, hotel and office.

Rattan Basket

Baskets are a weaving art that is usually formed from woven bamboo, rattan, bemban or pandanus trees. These baskets in particular are used to be used as containers to carry, store, measure and so on.

Keningau War Memorial, also known as Cho Huan Lai Memorial, is a monument that is dedicated to the Chinese Consul General Cho Huan Lai and his colleagues who died on the 6th of July 1945. This was after they were executed by the Japanese. The memorial is situated where Cho and his colleagues were executed, which is near to the former airfiend of Keningau. The monument is in the form of a towering stone monument about four metres high, with red old Chinese characters on it.

OKK Sedomon's mansion has been visited by various leaders and dignitaries. Among them are Sir William Goode, former British Governor of North Borneo, Duncan Sandys (British Commonwealth Relations Minister), Tunku Adbul Rahman Putra Al-Haj (Malaysia's First Prime Minister), and many more.

Apart from that, as there are many churches in Keningau, the priests typically serve a lot of parishes rather than just being assigned to just one. Instead, the parochial house will be in charge of many churches located inside its boundaries. For instance, the St Francis Xavier Cathedral, under The Roman Catholic Diocese of Keningau, is in charge of 69 other outstation Catholic churches and chapels all over Keningau.

Introduction To Gastronomic Delights In Keningau

Many first-time visitors that came to visit Malaysia could understand why this country is also known for its cuisine. This nation provides a fantastic gourmet experience. There is a wide range of interesting eateries and food merchants that can be found all over the country.

The culturally diverse country of Malaysia has played a significant role in the Malaysian food industry. Therefore, the state of Sabah has its own distinct flavour and exciting palettes with dishes influenced by Sabah's lush coastline and tribal history.

Sabah offers various kinds of delicacies which are from both local and foreign. When you visit Keningau, you're in for a treat! It is highly recommended for you to try out all the mouth-watering local delicacies that can only be found in Sabah, specifically in Keningau! Don't forget to try out their traditional food as well! We have prepared a list of dishes for you to try and also plenty of places for you to eat when you are in Keningau.



Must Try Snacks & Dishes In Keningau

Tuhau

Tuhau is a traditional food of the KadazanDusun ethnic group. It is a special food in Sabah and is usually cooked on Hari Gawai and Hari Kaamatan. Tuhau is a type of plant which is a wild ginger that grows in the forests of Borneo in Sabah. The tuhau is scientifically known as etlingera coccinea, and it is an endemic species in Borneo.

There are many ways to eat tuhau; it can be eaten plain as a side dish and can also be cooked. The inside of the tuhau stem will be peeled and cut into small pieces before it is mixed with other ingredients such as salt, red chilli and lemon. The special thing is that the tuhau can be stored for a long time and served at any time. It is suitable to be eaten with hot rice and side dishes such as fish and vegetables.

Bosou/Nonsom

Bosou, also known as Nonsom, is one of the special traditional side dishes that acts as an appetiser for the KadazanDusun ethnic group. It is a traditional food that resembles pickling. Bosou is a food made from raw fish or meat that is pickled for about five to seven days before being preserved to eat.

The main ingredients are fresh fish, fruits or vegetables that are mixed with some other ingredients such as rice and salt. It can also be added jackfruit, pineapple, and tuhau to add more flavour. Kepayang fruit, scientifically known as pangium, is also added as a preservative to prevent this dish from becoming stale and smelly.



Hinava

Hinava is a traditional food in Sabah, especially for the KadazanDusun ethnic group, where it is one of the most popular foods that is loved by the ethnic group since previous generations. The hinava is often served as a daily menu and is a mandatory dish for special days such as weddings or festive days such as the Harvest Festival. The KadazanDusun community usually serves the hinava on normal days to be used as an additional food to have more appetite when eating.

The hinava is made from fresh fish, lime juice, bird's eye chilli, bitter gourd, ginger, and sliced shallots. This dish is a raw fish salad similar to sushi, hence the fish does not need to be cooked because it will be cooked by the lime juice.

Butod

Butod is a sago worm or sago grub that is an exotic delicacy for the people of Sabah. The butod is actually a larva of the Sago Palm Weevil, which is a type of snout beetle that feeds on sago palms. The spongy internal of the sago palms' trunk are the best place to collect the sago worms before they grow and turn into beetles after two months.

It can be eaten raw, which means it can be directly eaten when it is still alive, or it can be cooked by either frying, boiling or grilling it. The butod gives out a creamy and sweet taste as the juicy worm melts inside your mouth when you take a first bite of it.

Linopot

Linopot is rice that has been neatly packed and wrapped in a large leaf. Linopot literally means packing in the Dusun language. Hence, linopot rice means rice that is packed. This dish is usually made of white rice that will be packed together with other ingredients such as yam, pumpkin, cassava, anchovies and so on. In addition, it can also be eaten with stirfried vegetables and dried fish to add more flavour.

The linopot is traditionally prepared by using hill paddy, and new varieties of rice can be produced by combining the rice with other starchy crops like yam. Once the rice is ready, the next step is to pack it into linopot by using any large and fresh leaves that are clean.

Ambuyat

Ambuyat is a traditional food of the Malay-Brunei community. Besides the Malay-Brunei community, this dish is also a traditional food for the Bajau, KadazanDusun, Bisaya and Murut community, and most of them call this dish Linut. However, this dish is favourable to the Malay-Brunei community, hence the name of the dish Ambuyat seems to be more popular.

Ambuyat comes from the inner stem of the sago palm. It is a bland starchy substance similar to starchy potatoes. The main ingredients needed to make ambuyat are sago flour and hot water. With a certain measurement of the hot water, the sago flour is stirred until it becomes elastic, with a clear and slightly sticky texture. It is often eaten with gravy that is either spicy or sour.

Must Try Snacks & Dishes In Keningau

Pinasakan

Pinasakan is one of the traditional foods in Sabah. It is a traditional favourite food for the KadazanDusun community. Although pinasakan is a traditional food of the KadazanDusun community, it has now become one of the favourite foods of all people in the state of Sabah.

Pinasakan is fish that is mixed with several other ingredients to add more flavour. To make this dish, the fish will be cleaned and mixed with some ground turmeric and ginger, some tamarind seeds or fruit, salt, seasoning powder and a little water. Then, it will be heated until it boils and until the water is almost dry.

Ngiu Chap

Ngiu Chap is Sabah's own variation of beef noodle soup. Ngiu chap literally means mixed beef in Hakka language. The name comes from the mix of different cuts of beef that come with the soup, mainly sliced beef, beef balls, brisket, tendon, tripe, and beef tongue. It is usually served with different types of noodles with thick beef broth that is not overly greasy yet it is full of flavour.



Losun

Losun is a traditional cuisine of the KadazanDusun community in Sabah; it is known as the wild spring onions of Borneo. The scientific name of losun is Allium Chinense. This plant is a type of onion plant that is often used as a fresh vegetable, pickled or fried with other vegetables. It can be mixed with salted fish or anchovies to this dish and can definitely add to the taste.

The first step in cooking the losun is by heating the oil and frying the garlic, shallots and anchovies until fragrant. Next, add the white chilli and let it cook until wilted. After that, add the losun with a torch ginger flower. Lastly, stir once or twice and season with salt, sugar or seasoning of choice and stir again. Then, you are done. It is advisable to not cook it for a long time because the losun softens quickly.

Bambangan

Bambangan fruit, scientifically known as Mangifera Pajang,

is one of the local fruits in the state of Sabah. It is also known as Wild Mango as it is categorised in the Mango family. This fruit looks like a mango but the size is bigger and the skin is slightly thicker than normal mangoes as well. This fruit has a very fragrant smell and it is very tasty when eaten just like that. Some even make it as a pickle. However, many communities use this fruit to make pickles such as Pickled Bambangan or known as Bambangan Tonsom for the KadazanDusun community. In addition, some also mix it with other ingredients to make sambal.
